Gookonaanig Endaawaad (Grandmas' House) is a language nest for babies 0 to 5 years old. We are housed on the homelands of The Fond Du Lac Band of Lake Superior Chippewa, in north-eastern Minnesota. Gookonaanig Endaawaad brings together families of language learners, elders, and staff to raise first language speakers and revitalize Ojibwe language through a community and family centered approach.

Currently, programming for the Ojibwe Immersion 3-5yr old drop off program runs September 5, 2023 to May 31, 2024, Monday through Thursday from 9:00am to 2pm with an option for family members to bring children to Friday fieldtrips from 10am to 1pm.
